Our 333rd. Engr. Regt. left Toledo Ordnance Depot on Saturday, November 28 and arrived out here in Arizona the following Wednesday morning.

believe he is better now. He is doing some very good work as Co. D Mess Sgt.

I believe the majority of our men are anxious to get into foreign soil where we can feel we are doing something more direct to the winning of the war.

I enjoy the K.V.P. News Gram every week, and I hope to receive some letters from some that worked beside me as I am very anxious to know how things are on my old tower, and in closing, I am wishing all my K.V.P. friends a very Merry Christmas and the Happiest and most Prosperous of years.
